


## 2020-2022 Annual Report



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### A Word from Leadership

Hello Communities In Schools of Ohio Partners,

These last three years have been full of challenges, but also full of incredible opportunities for learning and growth. During school closures due to the pandemic, our staff showed the ability to quickly pivot to be responsive to the needs of our students, schools, and families. When the schools needed to distribute technology, our team was there to help get the equipment to the students quickly. As learning transitioned to taking place online, we were there to help with connectivity. Since many of our students

rely on the schools for their meals, we were there to help with meal distribution. We also partnered with other education-focused groups and created resource kits to expand at-home learning. Our team really stepped up to support parents, schools, and principals by showing we are All IN For Kids!

If there is a barrier to student learning, we work to help eliminate it. When students come to school worried about where their next meal will come from, where they might be sleeping at night, or how they will complete assignments when the electricity is turned off at home, we connect students and their families with the services they need. We do this because our organization works with an evidence-based model that shows students can better engage in school and be academically successful when those non-academic barriers are strategically assessed and addressed.

This report highlights the progress our students made during the 2020-2021 school year, and the fact that our students showed progress during a worldwide pandemic is to be celebrated. We grew from working in 22 schools in the 2018-2019 school year to 38



#### Student Impact Continued

During the 2021- 2022 school year, we served 15,429 students with 1,274 students receiving individualized and targeted support to best support their needs.

Every school year, we work shoulder to shoulder alongside our students, their families and their schools in order to help students see their own potential. CIS Site Coordinators serve simultaneously as community resource partners, advocates, caring adult role models and family support liaisons to create a web of support and access to resources and opportunities that they might not otherwise have. When students come across barriers, we help them foster and harness the tools and resources they need in order to navigate trying situations. We help them realize the power of their own voice and their own actions so that they can live out their potential. We support students in schools and beyond by building a lasting network of trust around them.



#### **Success Stories**

To help stay on track, Ladavion and his Communities In School of Ohio (CIS) Site Coordinator drafted a game plan outlining his goals for school attendance. That plan was shared with his school counselor who also helped provide an outline for what he needed to graduate on time.

Thanks to this teamwork, Ladavion overcame his attendance delinquency and focused on his coursework. His attendance improved tremendously along with his grades. He was able to complete all his credit recovery classes and maintained passing grades in his current classes. Due to his success in meeting his goals, Ladavion received a MacBook Air from CIS and graduated on time.

Ladavion has plans to attend Columbus State University winter semester where he will utilize the resource provided by CIS to further his educational career.

London B. from Briggs High School received academic support from her CIS School Coordinator before the pandemic. When the schools were closed due to COVID-19, London missed being involved in band and track but that did not stop her from excelling in her online academic work. London kept in touch with her CIS coordinator through email as she continued with her online work into the 2021-2022 school year.

Her hard work was rewarded when she was inducted into the National Honor Society and she received so many college scholarships that she had to turn some of them down! She graduated from Briggs in 2022 and her CIS Coordinator was there cheering her on.


